I the undersigned was present in the Sinn Fein Hall on Monday night 20th. March 1916, having entered the Hall about 8 o'clock accompanied by Volunteer Thomas Duggan. When I entered the Hall there was a number of Cumann-na-mBan and Irish Volunteers present, which included Capt. Peadar Bracken, I/Lt. Seamus O'Brennan, and 2/Lt. Joseph Wrafter A few minutes after my arrival in the rooms a mob arrived and took up their positions outside. Capt. Bracken advised the Volunteers not to pass any remarks and suggested continuing with a Dance. The mob then threw bricks and stones through the windows. As the position got very serious at 9-30 Capt. Bracken and Lt. O'Brennan who were armed decided to escort the Members of Cummann-na-mBan to their homes. On the way back to the Hall several attempts were made to assault them. They found it nesessary to draw their guns. After they entered the Hall the crowd became more hostile and more noisy. At about 10+15 P.M. I heard a rush being made I went on to the landing and saw Volunteer Frank Brennan running towards the door followed by part of the mob. When he got to the door he turned around and drew a revolver and fired a shot in the air he then entered the rooms. After his arrival more stones and bricks came through the windows. Capt Bracken fired a shot through the window. About ten minutes later Co. Inspector Crane, District Inspector Fitzgerald Head Constable Stewart and Sergeant Ahearne entered the Hall, Inspector Crane carrying a stick and Sgt. Ahearne a Hurley. Inspector Crane asked whofired the shots and Capt. Bracken answered "We did"in self defence", Inspector Crane then said that noboby would be allowed to use firearms and ordered the Volunteers to fall in for a search. Just then a Large number of R.I.C. entered the Hall Peadar Bracken and Seamus Brennan were standing together, drew their revolvers .Capt. Bracken shouted "Volunteers dont allow yourselves to be searched". Sgt. Ahearne and Inspector Fitzgerald rushed towards Bracken confusion reigned and shots rang out. Inspector Crane rushed Seamus Brennan who had his revolver drawn, he struck the revolver in Brennan's hand and the shot went into the ground. This revolver which was a Spanish Automatic and which I saw "jammed" the previous Sunday on thexRangeRifle Rangewh when the first shot was fired from it. The Co. Inspector now fell on his knees at O'Brennan's feet. O'Brennan now had the barrell of the revolver in his hand. He struck the Inspector on the forehead and eyes with the revolver and the Inspector fell unconsious on the floor. Vol. Thomas Byrne who seized the hurley in the melee from Sgt. Ahearne struck Head Constable Stewart on the head with it and knocked him on the floor. The other Volunteers were in handigrips with the police. The Police that night succeeded in arresting Lt. Joseph Wrafter, Vol. Thomas Byrne, Vol. Joseph Morris, and Vol. Henry McNally. The other Volunteers escaped fro the Hall, but on Thursday the 23rd. March the following were arrested, Volunteers Frank O'Brennan, John Delaney, Thomas Hogan, Thomas Duggan, Joseph Graham, James Clarke, John Spain, John Martin and Edward Downes. All the prisoners were lodged in Tullamore Jail, the Last three named above being released after a month owing to their age. The other prisoners were removed to Richmond Barracks Dublin, after the Rising in May 1916, where we again met Capt. Bracken and Lt. O'Brennan. We were tried & collectively at a General Court Martial in the last week of May,or

Of THE FIRST week of Jume 1916. After the Trial we were removed to Kilmainham Prison. Copies of the Original Charge Sheet, which was served on each prisoner enclosed. The original of same is in the possession of Mr Alo Brennan, Cormac St., Tullamore.

Official Report issued from British Military Headquarters in Dublin , on Thursday 22nd. June 1916

The following prisoners from Tullamore, vIz: - James O'Brennan, Frank O'Brennan, John Delaney, Joseph Morris, Thomas Duggan, Joseph Graham, Peadar Bracken, Thomas Byrne, James Clarke, Henry McNally, Thomas Hogan and Joseph Wrafter, were tried by General Court Martial on the 26th. May. They were charged with attempted and murder of Co. Inspector Crane, District Inspector Fitzgerald, and Sgt. Aherne while an attempt was being made by the police to enter the Sinn Fein Hall on the 20th. March to disarm a number of men who were in possession of the Hallfrom which shots were being fired and Sgt. Aherne received a bullet wound which placed his life in danger for several weeks. The Prisoners after being decharged before the Local magistrate, were handed over to the Military and at their Court Martial which followed, Mr Healy K.C. who appeared for them contended that they had being illegaly transferred from the Civil to the Military Authorities. The General Officer Commanding in Chatf has not confirmed the proceedings, and has ordered their release from Military custody.

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
