STATEMENT OF MISS ELIZABETH ANNE O'BRIEN 7, WALSH'S TERRACE, STRAND STREET, TRALEE,

PERIOD:

JANUARY 1915 TO EASTER 1916.

UNIT:

TRALEE BRANCH, CUMANN_NA-mBHAN.

The Tralee Branch of Cumann-na-mBhan was officially started at a meeting held in the Rink (Volunteer Headquarters) on 26th January, 1915. Miss McCarthy from Dublin, National Organiser, attended and spoke at the meeting. She was introduced by Tom Slattery, R.D.C., who presided. About sixty women and girls attended the meeting. Prior to that, five or six of us had been active since the formation of the Volunteers in giving them every assistance we could, such as catering for dances.

The following Committee was elected that night:-

The Committee met subsequently and appointed me President, Nellie Barry, Hon. Secretary, and Nora O'Leary, Hon. Treasurer. There was no change of Officers or Committee down to Easter, 1916.

There was no Cumann-na-mBhan organisation in the County outside Trales when we started, but during 1915 we organised separate Branches at Cak Park, Carrahsen, Barryroe, Farmers' Bridge, Ballymacelligott, Ardfert and Lixnaw. We started with about 40 members in Trales and we had about 80 at Easter 1916.

Parades were held regularly twice a week at the Rink from the start up to Easter, 1916, either for drills or for classes. Drill instruction was given by Volunteer Officers. First aid classes and sewing classes were in constant operation. We made all the haversacks for the Tralee Volunteers; also a number of canvas bandoliers and a number of sleeping bags. We made thousands of green and gold ribbon badges and sold them. We ran dances, concerts and collections at Races and sports meetings, as well as carrying out a house to house collection in the town for the Volunteers. We did all the catering for the Volunteer dances. We held two bazaars, all the material for which we collected free in the town. Both of them were very successful and were the means of raising substantial funds. We had no uniforms before 1916; we did not consider them necessary.

We had at all times direct contact with Cumann-na-mBhan headquarters in Dublin, though we got very little actual assistance from them after the start. We worked on our own initiative trying to do the best we could to help the Volunteers in every way possible. There was always the closest co-operation and goodwill between the Volunteers and ourselves. Nellie Barry and I were the Tralee Branch delegates to the Cumann-na-mBhan Convention held in Dublin in October, 1915.

From Good Friday night, 1916, to Easter Sunday night we were very fully engaged in catering for the Volunteers in the Rink. Monteith was brought to the Rink on Good Friday night and Nellie Hurley bandaged his arm. We supplied meals for him and for the guard on the Rink that night and next day. On Easter Sunday we had at least 150 men to cater for. Many of them had come from Dingle and other outside places. We got in the dinners and made the teas ourselves in the Rink. The girls worked willingly and enthusiastically, and we were prepared to do our part in whatever happened that week.
