STATEMENT BY JOHN O'DRISCOLL,

Timoleague, Co. Cork.

I joined the Irish Volunteers when Timoleague Company was formed in 1917. The company had a strength of about 56 and was commanded by Con Lehane. It was known as C/Company, 1st Battalion, 3rd Cork Brigade. The 1st Battalion was based on Bandon, miles from Timoleague. The early days of the company was mainly devoted to drilling and training.

In 1918 the threat of conscription sent many new men into the Volunteers and we looked about securing arms. We were in the centre of a farming district and many of our members already had shotguns. There was a shortage of ammunition and we commenced the job of filling cartridges, casting buckshot for this purpose.

In order to obtain funds, we organised a feis at Timoleague. The feis was proclaimed by the British military, but at the last minute we changed the venue to Barryroe and held the feis. The following Volunteers were arrested after the feis: Thomas Beachinor, John O'Brien, Cornelius Murphy and Con Lehane.

Beachinor, Lehane and Murphy were sentenced to three months.

The following arms were held by the company in 1918:20 shotguns; 2 revolvers; 800 cartridges; 50 rounds revolver ammunition; one .22 rifle and 1000 rounds.

The local Parish Priest was hostile to the Volunteers and on it being reported to us that explosives for blasting rocks were stored in his stables, orders were issued for their removal. William Foley, Mill Street, Timoleague, removed gelignite, fuse and detonators from the stables and conveyed them to a company dump.

When the conscription threat had passed we continued our training and, acting on orders from the battalion, we collected any shotguns held by civilians in our area. We may have missed a few guns because, in January 1920, one of our men, Patrick O'Driscoll of Abbeymahon, carried out a raid and got a shotgun.

In February 1920, plans were made to attack Timoleague R.I.C. Barracks. It was a battalion job but as the barracks was in our company area most of the preparations fell to us. All guns were cleaned and made ready. Ammunition was dried and checked.

One of our men, Thomas Maloney, was working in a local house which supplied goods to the barracks and he was instructed to obtain details of the layout and particulars of the garrison and their tours of duty. He supplied a full report. Gelignite was obtained from the Skibbereen area and a mine was prepared by Tadhg O'Sullivan, William Foley and Timothy Coughlan.

The attack took place on 25th February 1920. The barracks, which was situated in the main street, was held by a garrison of five. The land mine was placed in position and a group of five of our men was selected to rush the barrack door when the mine exploded. Roads leading to Timoleague were blocked by felling trees and the road-blocks nearer the village were guarded by armed parties.

When all was in readiness, an attempt was made to explode the mine while covering parties opened fire on the barracks. The mine did not explode. A load of hay was procured and placed on the mine before being set alight, but even then the mine would not explode. The attack, which opened at 10.30 p.m. lasted until 4 a.m. but we could make no impression on the barracks.

One of our men, John (Flyer) Nyhan was wounded. The R.I.C.

. suffered no loss. The inhabitants of the houses opposite the barracks had been removed from their houses before the attack opened.

Although the attack was not a success it gave many of our men very useful experience of being under fire, which stood to them in later engagements. After the attack all our arms and ammunition had to be collected and placed in secure places for future use. Some of the men who had taken part in the attack had to go on the run.

In March 1920, our local Parish Priest was delivering sermons denouncing the Volunteers and their activities. A report of the sermons was sent to the Press by a local reporter named J. O'Mahoney of Garranduig, Kilbrittain. After being warned, O'Mahoney was arrested and courtmartialled by Tadhg O'Sullivan, later Brigade Q.M., and James Hodnett, O/C. Timoleague Company. He was ordered to leave the area. The Parish Priest was warned that the Volunteers would not stand for any more of his sermons. The local people were warned that they were to cease having anything to do with the R.I.C.; and one of our men - Michael O'Brien - was deputed to leave notices under the doors of all local shop-keepers warning them against supplying goods to the R.I.C.

The R.I.C. were beginning to feel the strain of our activities and had commenced to evacuate some of their barracks and concentrate on larger posts. Courtmacsherry R.I.C. Barracks was evacuated in April 1920 and it was quickly destroyed by our company.

We raided the mails frequently and censored them against anyone conveying information to the R.I.C. or British military.

In April 1920, we observed that the R.I.C. from
Timoleague patrolled the road between Timoleague and
Lislevane. We prepared an ambush for them, but after waiting
one whole Sunday, they did not appear. We waited in
ambush on the Clonakilty-Timoleague road without result.

During all this time we were boycotting the R.I.C. and one man who continued to be friendly with them was tarred and feathered. I was at this time acting company captain and was in charge of the job with Tadhg O'Sullivan, brigade quartermaster, and about 18 of my company. We were continually trying to make contact with R.I.C. or military patrols and lay in ambush at Ballinadee in June 1920, and at Inchy Bridge in July 1920. In the same month we went into Timoleague to disarm a party of British military who usually escorted the local R.I.C. garrison to Mass on Sunday. Our plan was to mingle with the crowd leaving Mass and pounce on the military.

On the Sunday selected, the R.I.C. did not leave with the crowd. The Mass finished early and the military party did not arrive until the crowd had dispersed. The job was called off.

During 1920 many operations were carried out in our battalion area. When activities were going on in neighbouring company areas we were called upon to cut roads and bridges. The number of incidents of this nature in which I participated are too numerous to remember and they formed part of the general pattern over our brigade area.

At Battalion Council meetings nearly every battalion was reporting failure to meet the enemy at close quarters. The smaller R.I.C. garrison had evacuated their barracks

and patrols when they moved out were more heavily armed and large. The cycle patrols had given way to lorries and the R.I.C. had been reinforced or replaced by Black and Tans.

In September 1920, the brigade officers decided to establish a brigade column and, for this purpose, the battalion officers were asked to select men for special training. I went for training with James Hodnett, company captain, Daniel Minihane, 1st Lieut. and Tadhg O'Sullivan (R.I.P.), later brigade quartermaster. There were about 40 called for training to a camp which was established at O'Brien's, Clonbuig, Kilbrittain. Tom Barry had been appointed brigade training officer and he was in charge.

Clonbuig was situated $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from a Black and Tan post at Kilbrittain, six miles from Bandon and 15 miles from Kinsale where there were large British garrisons. We were well guarded by scouts which formed a ring round the camp area. When we arrived at the camp we were broken up into sections and section commanders were appointed. The training was heavy, we were kept at it all day for seven days, footdrill, extended order, ambush positions and finally after aiming practice we fired three or four rounds at targets.

At the end of training Tom Barry was appointed O/C. of the column and we moved from Clonbuig, taking up ambush positions on different roads. On the 9th October 1920, we lay in ambush at Farranbolus on the Dunmanway-Ballineen road and, although we waited until nightfall, the British did not appear. Shortly after this our column was disbanded.

About the time the column was being formed, seven members of our company raided a ship at Courtmacsherry. A pipe case was used to hold up the captain and a .45 revolver was captured. The following were on the job:-

About a fortnight later another ship was raided, but we got nothing.

At this time orders were issued to each battalion that a levy to support the arms fund should be collected in the whole brigade area. The work was passed on to the companies who had particular knowledge of the ability to pay of each farmer and shopkeeper in the company area. A number of people refused to pay the levy and in such cases a report was sent to the brigade O/C. Orders were issued by the brigade for the seizure of goods and livestock from the people concerned. Members of our company entered the village of Courtmacsherry and made seizures from some people who were very hostile. In one case the person raided was in touch with the local British military garrison by 'phone and our men only escaped in the darkness as they were being surrounded.

Our men also entered the village of Timoleague and made seizures but the British military learned of their presence and our men were fired on by the military. In all £300 was collected in the company area.

During all this period (1920) the normal work of the company was going on. Arms were kept in order, dumps and dugouts were prepared and the British garrisons were kept under constant observation and the movements reported to Battalion H. Q.

The R.I.C. had ceased to function as a police force and the keeping of order fell on the Volunteers. In one case we arrested a man for stealing a heifer which we recovered. The man was fined £15.

In November 1920, our whole company marched in military formation from Clonbuig to Murragh, a distance of nine miles passing within one mile of the heavily garrisoned town of Bandon. We were attending the funeral of Captain Michael O'Brien.

During November an ambush was being prepared on the road between Timoleague and Courtmacsherry and it was necessary to transport rifles and revolvers from Clonbuig, Kilbrittain to Carhue, Timoleague, but, after all the risk and trouble, the ambush did not come off.

In December 1920, we prepared an ambush for British military in Timoleague. The day selected was fair day when we thought to get near a British patrol passing through the fair. The British did not show up. In the same month we captured two British soldiers in the village of Timoleague and one on the main Clonakilty road, but, after holding them for a week, we were ordered to release them.

The R.I.C. barracks at Timoleague and Timoleague Castle which had been a British military post were evacuated. We burned the barracks and blew up the Castle. We also burned the house of a man named Travers. Travers's was a gentleman's residence.

In January 1921, an attack was carried out on Kilbrittain but, owing to the failure of a mine, the attack could not be pressed home. I was not in the attack, but as part of the general plan of the attack all roads leading to Kilbrittain were to be trenched or blocked and I was blocking roads when the attack was made.

As the result of reports made by Denis O'Driscoll, section commander, Timoleague, it was found necessary to visit the

homes of some girls in the village and warn them against associating with British military. Sean Hales, Battalion O/C., James Hodnett, company captain, Denis O'Driscoll and Peter Hourihan were in Timoleague on the job.

I entered Courtmacsherry with sixteen others and, while some of us covered the military barracks, the remainder burned Courtmacsherry Hotel which was to be occupied by military.

At this time the brigade officers decided on a plan to hamper the movements of British forces by the destruction of bridges and the trenching of roads. The parties engaged on the destruction or trenching were divided, some to carry out the work and the others armed to afford protection. I acted as armed guard for the destruction of the following bridges: Inchy and Timoleague bridges on the main Timoleague-Bandon road, Ballinascarthy Bridge on the main Clonakilty-Bandon Road and Kilamalooda Bridge.

About January 1921, a spy maned Bossiels had been shot in our area and his property was ordered to be confiscated.

I was instructed to remove his cattle from Ballinascarthy to Kilbrittain and Barryroe areas. The cattle were taken over by the Volunteers in these areas.

In March 1921, a spy named John Good, Barry's Hall, was shot in our area. I was not on the job.

Early in March 1921, I was recalled to the column to serve under Tom Barry. We were in an ambush position at Shippool on the Kinsale-Bandon road about the 17th March. The strength of the column had been increased to over 100 men armed with rifles. We lay in ambush all day, but no British party appeared. Scouts reported that the British had left Kinsale

but had turned back. We withdrew from our positions and lay up in billets all next day and when darkness fell we moved across the Cork-Bandon road to O'Leary's of Ballyhandle. Our column was in seven sections. I was in No. 3 section under Mick Crowley. When we got to O'Leary's, we were assigned to billets in surrounding houses. The local company was mobilised and put out a ring of sentries around the area. The officers appeared to be expecting the British to make some move against us. Between two and three a.m. we were alerted and ordered to assemble at O'Leary's, which had been made column H.Q. When we assembled we learned that lorries of British troops were moving in our direction from all sides. The British were moving slowly, some in Lorries and some on foot raiding houses as they moved along. The officers decided to wait in ambush for the British at Crossbarry, which is on the road between Bandon and Cork. The road is known as the old road which by-passes the town of Bandon from the top of Kilbrogan Hill. Crossbarry is eight miles from Bandon and 12 miles from Cork. Our section was posted inside the ditch on the north side of the road to the west of a cross carrying a road north to south. A mine was laid on the road at a farmhouse (Beasley's) and another between Beasley's and a stone barricade near the crossroads on our left. No. 2 section was immediately on our right, with No. 1 section next to them on the right, and No. 7 section further out to the right and a little to the rear. No. 6 section was immediately to our left, with No. 4 section to their left and a little to the rear. No. 5 section was to the rear of our position on high ground.

As we lay in position we could hear the sound of lorries coming towards us. We dug in and sought the best cover we could get. Our orders were to remain in cover

and not to show ourselves until the mine to the east of our position was exploded. We lay in position from about 4.30 a.m. and at about 8 a.m. a long line of British lorries drove slowly towards our position. Suddenly there was shouting from the British soldiers who started to scramble out of their lorries. They had seen some Volunteer who had shown himself. The order to fire was given and we opened up on the lorries and soldiers before us on the road. As we opened fire, Flor Begley, assistant brigade adjutant, who was a piper, struck up Irish airs on the pipes as he marched up and down Harold's farmyard right in the centre of the ambush position. The sections to our right and left joined their fire to ours. We were firing at the British soldiers at 5 or 10 yards range. No. 7 section was sweeping the road to our right with heavy The British broke, leaving their lorries they tried to escape across country to our front. Very few of those who got in front of our position got away. We were ordered out on the road to collect the British arms. The survivors of the party we had attacked were in full flight and we collected the arms without interference. A civilian (White) who had been a prisoner in one of the lorries had jumped for cover when the attack opened and escaped unhurt. He joined us in collecting the arms. The lorries on the road were prepared for burning and some of them had been set alight when firing broke out on our left. A column of British troops had advanced towards No. 4 section. They came under heavy fire from our men and they beat a hasty retreat. held our positions and further firing broke out from the direction of No. 5 section in our rear. We were collected and moved in their direction, but it was all over when we got there.

The British had come from Ballincollig, Kinsale and Bandon converging on the Crossbarry. The British column

coming from Bandon had reached Crossbarry before the other British units which gave us the chance of dealing with the three prongs of the advance separately.

When all the British were in full retreat we were reformed into our sections to move from the ambush position. We lost three killed in the action and a couple wounded. I am not sure of the British losses in men. We captured some rifles, a large quantity of ammunition and a Lewis gun with seven or eight pans. We retired, after fighting for about two hours, through Crowhill to Rearour and then to Gurranereigh where we billeted.

News reached us that our Brigade O/C., Charlie Hurley, had been caught on the morning of Crossbarry and had been killed in an attempt to fight his way out of a house where he had been trapped by one of the British columns moving to Crossbarry.

The Brigade officers decided to give our O/C. a military funeral at his native place, Clogagh, which was over 20 miles from our billets. On the evening after Crossbarry we left our billets and marched to Clogagh reaching there during the night or early morning. Charlie's remains were taken from the Church and we buried him with full military honours.

After the funeral we moved to Ahiohill where we went to billets. The column kept on the move and a few days after Crossbarry and ambush on a train between Clonakilty and Skibbaroen, but the British who were expected to travel on the train went by road.

On the morning of 30th March we had reached a position some miles to the west of Rosscarbery where we lay for the day. That night, Tom Barry, Column O/C., told us that we

were going to attack Rosscarbery R. I. C. Barracks. plan of attack was explained to us. It was planned to explode a mine against the barrack wall and then rush the breech made by the explosion. Tom Barry asked for Volunteers for the assault party which he proposed to lead. Twentyfive of us were selected and outside the village we were ordered to remove our boots which were loaded on to a horse The party to lay the mine hoisted the mine on their shoulders like a coffin and we walked behind. As the mining party approached the barracks we took cover in a lane on the opposite side of the road. The mine went up and we rushed Before we got out towards the barracks shouting as we ran. to the barracks a white flag was shown at one of the windows. Tom Barry ordered us to stop. We waited on the road for the R.I.C. to come out, then we heard a shout from the barracks "We hold on to the barracks" and a bomb was thrown at us from one of the windows.

The explosion had blown the protective steel shutters off the windows and made a breech in the wall, but the R.I.C. were continuing to fire and throw grenades. We were ordered to take cover and open fire on the windows of the barracks. The column O/C. was trying to force the garrison out of the ground floor; our fire was to keep them away from the upper windows. After a lot of firing the barrack was set alight. Two of the garrison had been killed and some wounded. We captured no arms as the garrison had left them in the burning building. We suffered no loss.

After the Rosscarbery attack I returned to my own battalion area where the local units were keeping up activities. The first activity I had on my return to my area was an attempt to ambush a British military party.

at Skeaf. The party were to travel by train and we removed some rails to force the train to stop. The train stopped, but there were no British troops aboard and we had to replace the rails to let the train proceed.

During the Spring of 1921, we had orders to raid and censor the mails. This was done as a routine duty and we did not expect to find much information, but it prevented would-be informers from using the mails to send information to the British.

One strange case was discovered in our area through a raid on the mails. The mails were taken at Burrane, Timoleague, and censored by James Hodnett, company captain; William Foley, brigade lieutenant engineers, and Daniel Minihane, 2nd Lieut. A letter was discovered in the mails addressed to the British military by a Miss May Sullivan of Ardmore, Timoleague. She informed the British that she was a member of Cumann na mBan and was in a position to give them valuable information.

Miss Sullivan was, in fact, a member of Cumann na mBan and had often saved men from arrest. She was tried and ordered to leave the country.

About April 1921, we prepared an ambush at Inchy Bridge, Timoleague. It was reported that the military would travel by rail. We lifted some rails and stopped the train but there were no military on it.

In April, a spy named William Good of Barry's Hall, Timoleague, was shot and, under orders of the Brigade, we removed cattle and horses from his land. The cattle and horses were sold for the arms fund. We later removed furniture and effects from the same man's house.

At this time I was appointed battalion transport officer, 1st Battalion, 3rd Cork Brigade. My duties as transport officer were to ensure that bicycles, horses and carts and boats (river) were always available at certain points over the battalion area. This was especially necessary when the battalion or brigade columns were on the move. I was not relieved of my position as a trained column man as I was liable to be called for column service at any time.

The British at this time were moving in columns of 200 or 300 men moving across country on by-roads. It was necessary to keep bridges cut and to cut additional bridges. on their line of march. With this object in view, we destroyed Ballycotton Bridge on the main road Timoleague-Bandon.

Orders were issued by the brigade that a general shoot-up of British garrisons was to take place on 14th May 1921. I was one of a party which entered Courtmacsherry. Our orders were to shoot any British forces we saw. We opened fire on two British soldiers, killing one and wounding another.

On 11th May, a Battalion Council meeting had been held and the captain of Timoleague Company - Cornelius Murphy ran into a column of military when returning from the meeting and was shot dead. We buried him at midnight in Clogagh with full military honours.

I was arrested by British military at Amonister when returning from Barryroe Company area to Battalion H.Q.
